## Hosts Australian Scholar



In late May of 1964, Anna Whittaker received word that she had been selected as one of thirty-five high school students in this district to be a Rotary International Foreign exchange student.

In August of 1964 Anna flew from New York to Perth, Australia, where she met one of the Australian families with whom she would live. Anna will live with four or five different families all living around Scarborough Beach, Western Australia.

Anna attends school there and has found it to be quite different from Oxford Academy. Their school starts in February and ends in December for summer vacation. Thus, Anna will have three summers in a row.

June will find Anna homeward bound. She will travel through the Suez Canal to Italy where she will commence a sixteen-day tour of southern Europe and England and then return home in late July.

Anna's letters show us that she has attained a great deal of knowledge and satisfaction from her year in Australia.


The Oxford Academy and Central High School warmly welcomes Carolyn Joan Dawson. Carolyn is sixteen years old and a member of the Rotary International Student Exchange Program from Horsham, Australia.
