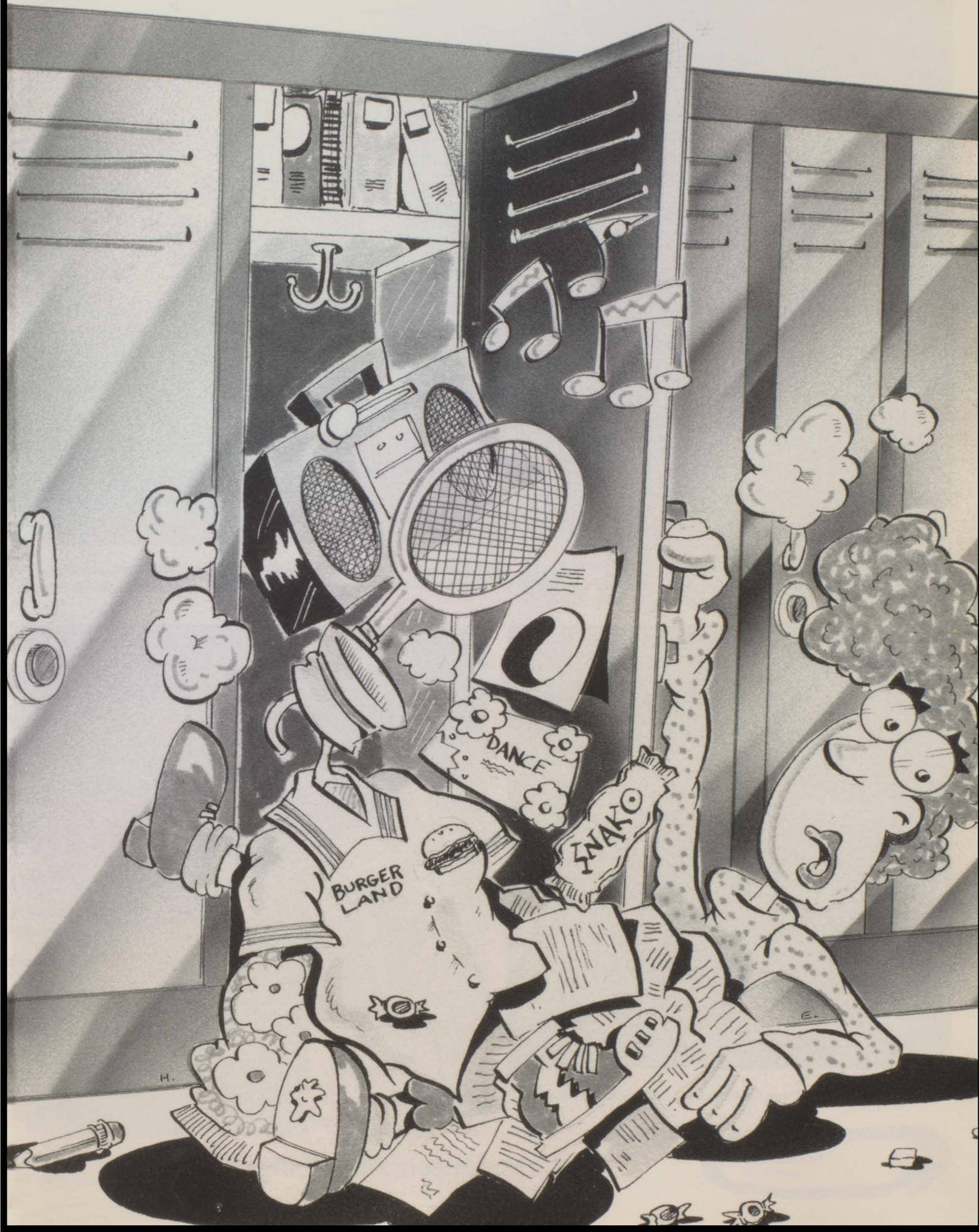
To Student Life

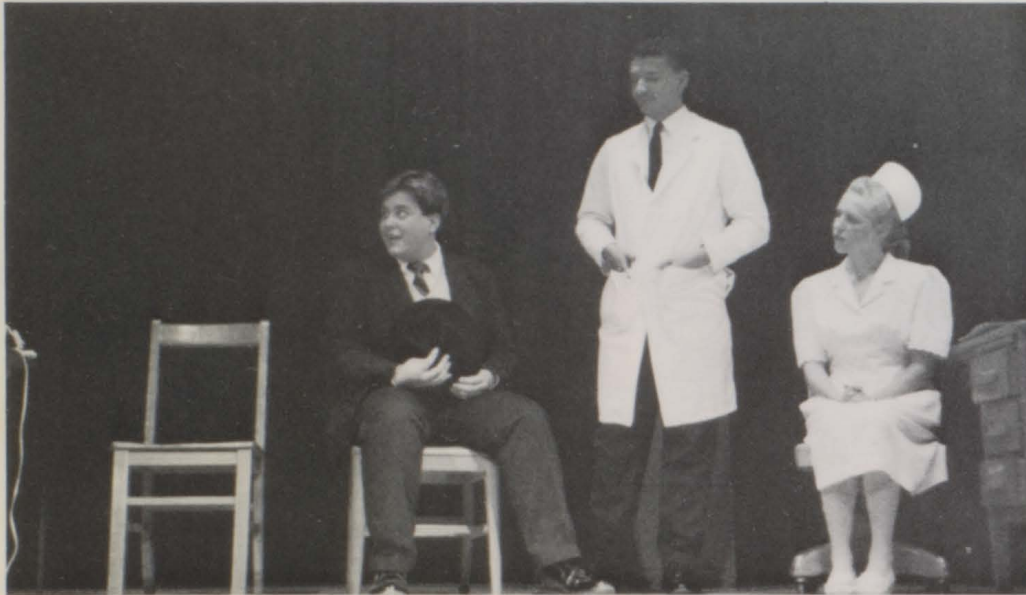

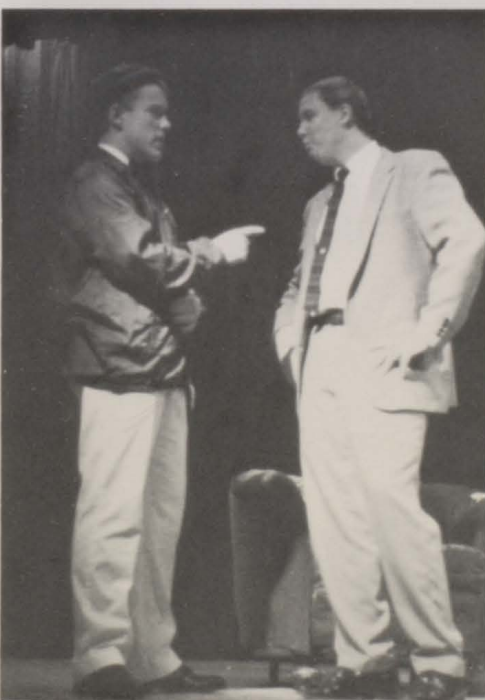

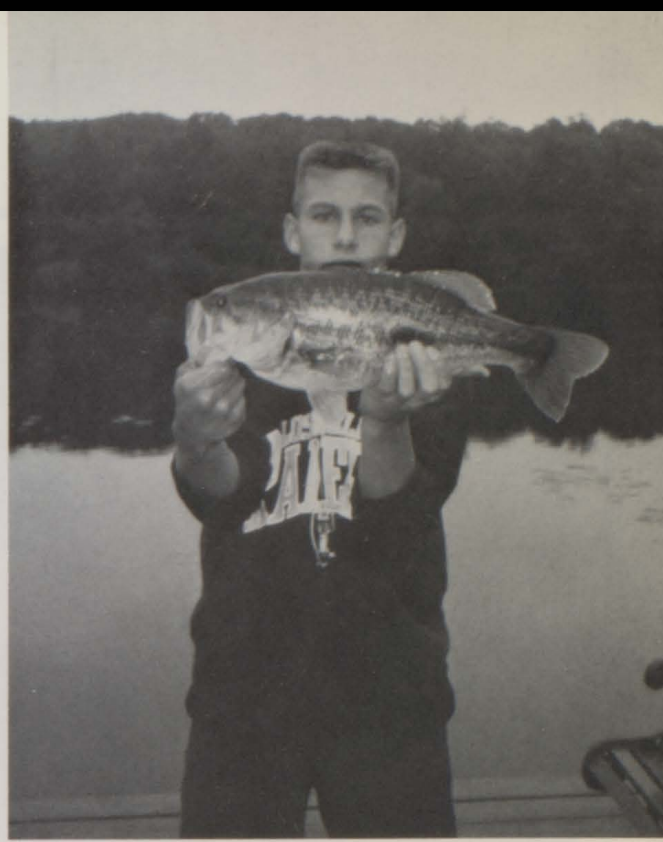

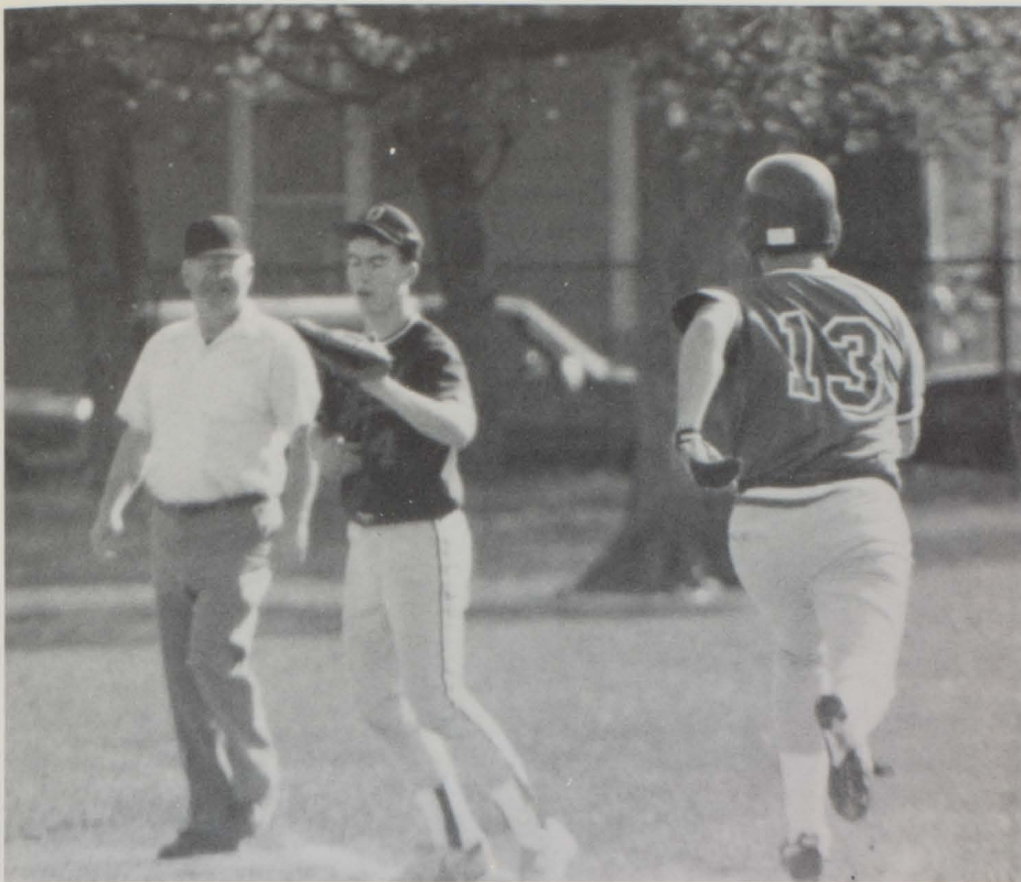

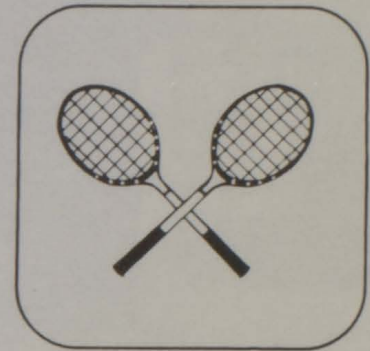

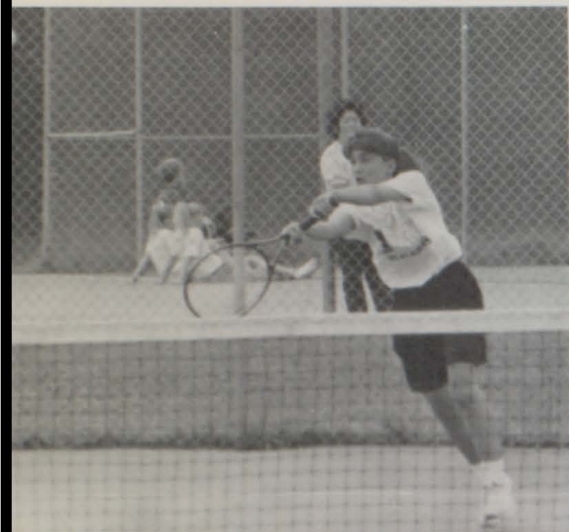

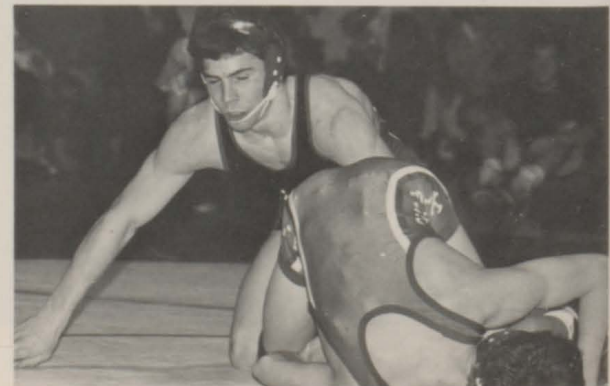

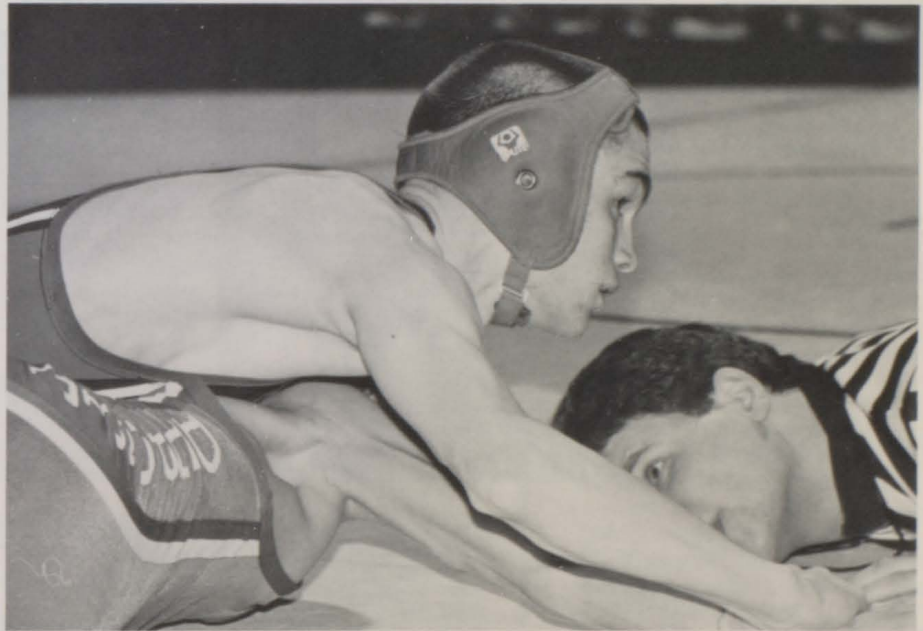

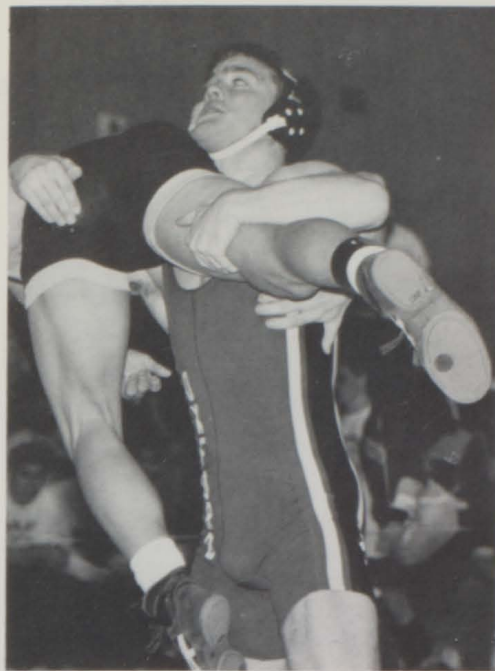
Hansen First Black-Hawk State Champ

What is Peer Mediation? Peer Mediation is a group of people who want to help students solve their problems without a fight. Students and teachers are trained to help the students by talking to them and having them sit down and talk it over.

The mediation process is very clearly defined, with rules that outline the process itself. Each disputant is given uninterrupted time to define the problem as they see it. The counselors help find the problem and help them solve it. An agreement is signed by all disputants at the end of the mediation. Mediators check with disputants after the session to make sure the agreement is being followed by all disputants. Everything is confidential.

There are 8 advisors. They are Mrs. Fallis, Mr. Orcutt, Mr. Tompkins, Mrs. Hall, Mrs. Spencer-Livingstone, Ms. Truman, Mrs. Pluta, and Mr. Griffin. Two advisors work per month. The advisors start the process by talking with the disputants. M. Golden

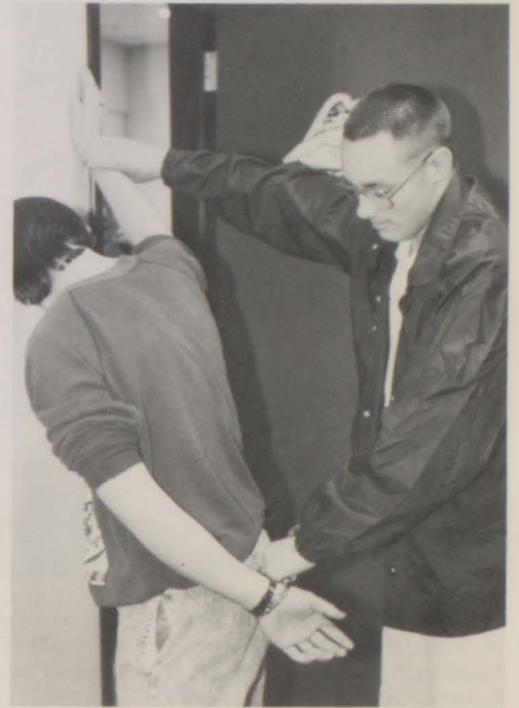

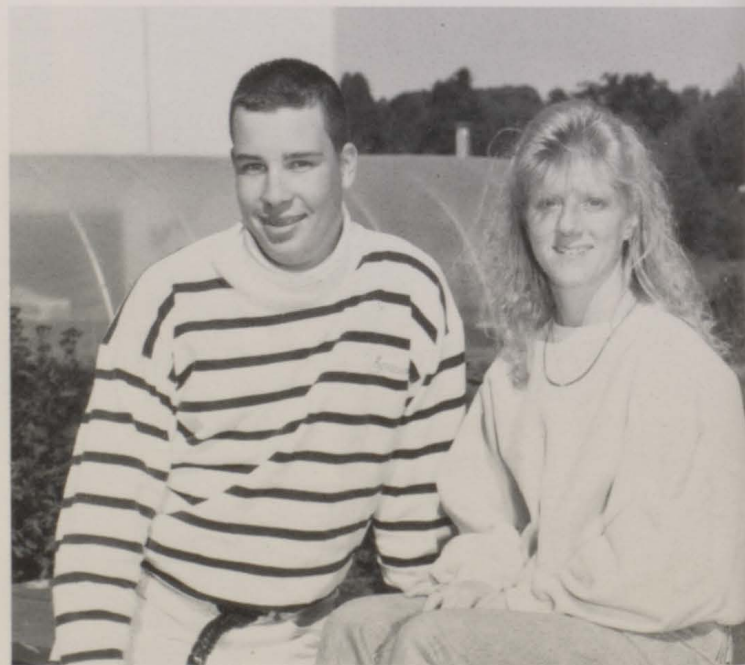



In January, Colby Cooper became not only the first Oxford student to win the local competition, but became the first student from Oxford to win the Eastern Division of the Sixth District of the American Legion National High School Oratorical Contest. He competed against the champions of Cortland, Delaware, Madison, and Otsego counties.

He first gave his winning speech, "Our Frontier," in November at the high school. "Our Frontier" is a positive look at American democracy. Colby analyzed our nation's achievements during the administrations of different presidents elected in this century emphasizing the importance of voting for our representatives and heralded the 1992 election as a healthy sign for the future.

Colby advanced to the zone competition, held in February, where he placed third and won a \$500 savings bond for his achievement. E. Anderson

Unique Career Experience

The Unique Career Placement Program is an exciting option for high school seniors to work twelve and one half hours weekly with a mentor in a career of their choice. This special program is designed to provide the students with a chance to explore their future career goals.

Students are recommended by home school counselors and must complete application forms, write an essay and be interviewed by the Unique Career Placement Coordinator in order to be accepted into the program.

Students will have the opportunity for many on-the-job learning experiences. They will develop good work attitudes and responsibilities and become familiar with specific job requirements.

Mentors will have a chance to contribute to student's education in their chosen careers. They can encourage students to enter their field while providing a valuable work experience for them.

What is a Cooperative Work Experience Program?

This program is a cooperative effort between the BOCES TEC Centers and area employers. It is structured to provide a hands-on work experience for TEC Center students who have acquired entry level job skills and who are ready to make the transition between their occupational education and the workforce. This is primarily an educational program which places students in the work environment for several weeks per semester under the supervision of a certified work experience coordinator employed by the TEC Center. Students are given course credit for this experience and some are paid depending on the situation. This program complies with labor laws and allows employers to receive federal tax credit for their participation.
